Here is a recent example of **Vince Blayney's** solution to a member's computer problem.

- **Problem**

When saving a backup image of a HD using Macrium reflect, instead of one file it saved the image as a number of files.

- **Solution**

A check of the member's external hard drive showed it was formatted as FAT 32 file system, which limited the largest file to 4GB. Therefore it was necessary to reformat the external drive to NTFS file system which has no realistic file-size or partition limits. This solved the problem.

# Tech TIPS

- **SNAPPING WINDOWS**

With Windows operating systems, you can have several applications open at the same time. However, they may not all be visible on the screen at the same time. While it is possible to manually resize and position windows to view two or more simultaneously, this can be a tedious process.

Windows 7 allows you to quickly display two applications side-by-side on the screen by snapping one to the left side of the screen and the other to the right side. To snap an app to one half of the screen, click on its window title bar and drag it to the required side. Drag a second app to the other side of the screen to snap it to that side.

With Windows 10, it is possible to display four apps in a quarter of the screen each. Simply drag each app window by its title bar to the required corner of the screen to have that app snap to that quarter of the screen.

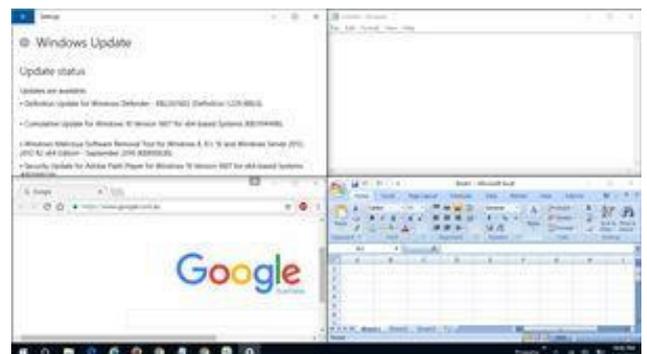
If you have trouble snapping app windows with the mouse or touchpad, try these keyboard shortcuts:

Windows 7 - Win key + right or left arrow key.

Windows 10 - Same as for Windows 7 to snap right or left, then Win key + up or down arrow key to position an app window in the required quarter of the screen.

Denis was a good and respected member.



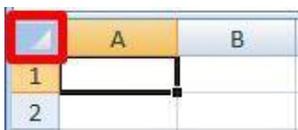
Part of the Annis and George Bills legacy - corner West Botany and Bryant Streets, Rockdale

## SELECT AN ENTIRE EXCEL WORKSHEET

If you ever need to select an entire Excel worksheet for copying or editing, here are three ways you can do this:

1. Click on the button in the upper-left corner of your spreadsheet, where the column and row headers intersect.



2. Press **Ctrl+Shift+Space Bar**.
3. Press **Ctrl+A**.

## MALICIOUS SOFTWARE REMOVAL TOOL

If you have ever checked the Windows updates being installed on your computer, you would have seen references to updates for a Malicious Software Removal Tool. Where is it and what does it do?

This has been part of Windows since Vista, and is designed to detect some of the most well-known instances of malware. Windows automatically runs the tool regularly on your PC, quietly in the background. Normally you won't notice anything, but you'll get a warning notice if it finds anything suspicious in order that you can take further action.

Although the tool is useful, it doesn't always provide as much protection as it could. You'll only see the warnings about possible malware if you log in as an administrator, and not everyone does that. Also, the tool needs to be updated every month and Windows won't warn you if this fails to happen correctly. Most crucially, the tool only runs a "quick scan" when it runs automatically in the background. Although it is also capable of running a much longer in-depth scan, this doesn't happen by default.

If you like to ensure that your PC is free of malware, it's a good idea to run the Malicious Software Removal Tool manually occasionally, instead of relying on Windows to take care of things. Running it manually has two main advantages. Firstly, it allows you to verify that the tool is up to date. Secondly, you can opt for a full in-depth scan, which will help to detect any hidden malware that has previously been undetected.

To run the tool, use the Windows search box to look for MRT (that's MRT rather than MSRT). Run the command as administrator when it appears in the search results. You'll then see a screen from which you can both verify the date it was last updated, and perform an in-depth scan.

### Scan types:

- **Quick Scan.** Scans areas of the system most likely to contain malicious software. If malicious software is found, you may be prompted to run a full scan.
- **Full scan.** Scans the entire system. Note that this scan can take up to several hours.
- **Customised scan.** In addition to a quick scan, the tool will also scan the contents of a user-specified folder.
