INTERNET

Can you remember all those important dates that have accumulated in your life? It was not too bad in the beginning. Your wedding anniversary, your spouse's birthday, then came the little darlings, and the little darlings' darlings. Not to mention MOTHER-IN-LAW, and your and his/her other relations.

There is a light at the end of the tunnel! Microsoft have a very handy, very clever thing called Windows Address Book (WAB) hidden away in the bowels of each their Operating System (OS). It is a fantastic database providing lots of places where you can store vital informations. If Grandma's BRAGBOOK happens to be hiding in a "Safe place" you can look up the WAB in your PC. There it is! Your sister in laws eleventh grandson – Charlie- was born on the 30th of February 1996.

How do find this elusive thing? It is not on your Desktop, nor in your Program files. There are no clues where to find it. There is a simple way to ferret out WAB. You do a "SEARCH" if you are looking for something hidden in your PC.

Go to "START">SEARCH, or FIND, depending on your Operating System, in the Dropdown Menu click on "All files and folders" Here you type in *. (Star/asterisk) then . (Dot/full stop) Now type WAB (Windows Address Book) either lower or upper case works. Now you are ready to hit "FIND" or "SEARCH"

If you have not done this before and shifted the WAB to a different location, it should be in your "C" drive looking like an open book with wab extension. Right click on the icon, and then click on "Send to" and select "Desktop" (create short cut) now you have easy access to your WAB. I have dragged this down to my "Taskbar" to be at my beck and call at all times. You can also place this in your start menu should you so desire.

Now start filling your WAB with the information you want to store there. Right click>open, or double click/click (Depending how you set your mouse)

Once WAB is open click on "NEW" (File>New contact/ Ctrl+N) the first page is where the Names, Title and email address are. As soon as you start entering the name you'll see it appearing in the second middle bar, "Display" By manipulating the down arrow you can set the way the name will appear in the finished product. Now type in email address>Add>.set as default>OK

Your first page is completed. Have a look at the rest. Play around with. Do not forget to hit OK to save your work.

TIPS FROM TOPSY

Tabs inside of tables

When you need to use Tab inside a table, press CONTROL + TAB.

Clip art on line

When you can't find what you want in your Clip art collection, use the Web.

Microsoft Clip Gallery Live.

Open menus and select commands from the keyboard.

Press ALT plus the letter underlined to open menu such as File, Edit, View etc. Once a menu is open you don't need to press ALT to select a command, just press the underlined letter of the command you want to select. e.g Print Preview - ALT, F, V. Toolbars - ALT V, T.

Using undo from the menu bar or short cut key

Made a mistake? Press CONTROL + Z, or choose icon from Toolbar.

Selecting

Select a sentence Hold down CONTROL and click anywhere in the sentence.

Select a paragraph Triple click within the paragraph or move the mouse just past the left margin of the paragraph. When the pointer changes to a right pointing arrow, double click to select the whole paragraph.

Select a table Select a table by holding down ALT and double clicking anywhere in the table.

Select the whole document - Use CONTROL + A (the only way).

Select a word Double click on it.

ALSO Using SHIFT + left or right arrow gives a good control of selecting.

Changing Size Of Font With Keyboard Strokes

Select the font to change Hit CONTROL + Open or close square brackets []. This is called Grow Font and Shrink Font

Show/Hide Characters

Work with these displayed. Simply click the Show/Hide button (like a P back to front).

Helps with formatting, line and character spaces. DOES NOT PRINT.

Totals In Columns

Put the cursor in the last cell of the column of numbers. TABLE, FORMULA press Enter/OK to accept the default Sum function.

Page border

FORMAT, Borders and Shading, Page Border, choose Box, Options, Choose Measure from Text. This will place a border around the page and print all.

Go to/find/replace

Double click the left end of the status bar (i.e. beside the Page no.) and it will bring up the Go To/Find/Replace window.

Genealogy

The English census records were the topic of discussion at our March meeting. These records have been preserved since 1841 and every ten years after (except 1941) but because of privacy laws public access is only available up to 1901.

The 1901 UK census is now available on line by subscription and contains over 33 million individuals however a 'decoder software' freely downloadable from www.censusdecoder.com allows for identification of a family unit by surname but not the full household. Robin was good enough to demonstrate the 'decoder' and provided us with instruction sheets to help us do our own thing. Please note that we will not be having a meeting in April and our next meeting will be on Wednesday 11 May next when we will discuss English parish records.

VIEW MULTIPLE PAGES IN WORD

You can see several pages at a time in Print Preview. Just add the *Multiple Pages* button to the standard toolbar.

1. On the *File* Menu, click *Print Preview*.
2. Right click the toolbar and click *Standard*.
3. Right click the toolbar again and click *Customise*.
4. Holding down the Control key, drag a copy of the *Multiple Pages* button from the *Print Preview* toolbar to the standard toolbar.
5. Close Print Preview.

Now the *Multiple Pages* button appears in the Standard toolbar in print layout view. Just click it, and select how many pages you want to view.

CRACKING DOWN ON PORNOGRAPHY ON THE INTERNET

While the internet has provided greater access to information for all internet surfers, one of the biggest problems for the government and service providers has been the issue of cracking down on offensive and inappropriate web content.

So what steps has the government taken?

In 1999, the government introduced a comprehensive regulatory scheme banning X rated and restricted classification material. It also established NetAlert to assist families in using the internet in a safe and responsible way.

In late 2004, the Government launched the National CyberSafe program. It was a commitment worth \$30 million and was designed to educate all members of the community about the risks for children online with a special emphasis on the dangers of chat rooms. Chat rooms have proved very popular with young people but there have also been many unsavoury incidents with regard to them as well.

Today, all Australian internet service providers are also required to provide content filters for their customers at cost price or less. In this way parents can control the access their children have to the Internet from the family computer. If any ISP is found to be failing to comply with this code of practice, they can be fined up to \$27,500 per day. The problem for parents however is the access their children may have to computers that do not have such protection.

The government did consider introducing mandatory filtering of ISP's but the cost associated with it from the consumers' point of view was unacceptable. More importantly, simple filters were easily outsmarted by those submitting the offensive material to the web and as a consequence far more complex technologies were needed to make the filtering effective. A feasibility study found that more than \$45 million was required annually to put the filtering system in place.

Clearly, the internet and the associated issues surrounding it provide a challenge to our government with regard to protecting the community and drafting the appropriate legislation to deal with modern technology.
