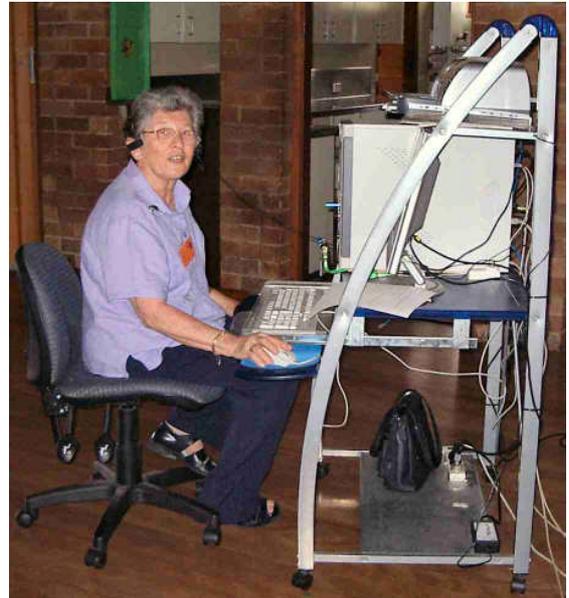
THANK YOU JOYCE

SOME QUICK TIPS TO CONSIDER

1.Quick File Opening

Why click twice when once will do?

Choose **Start**, followed by **My Computer**, then the **Tools** menu and finally, **Folder Options**.

Under the **General Tab**, choose " **Single Click to open an item**" and then click **OK**

2.Quick Launch

Start your favourite program with one click from the Taskbar by right-clicking a blank space on the Taskbar then choose **Properties**.

Choose **Show quick Launch** then **Apply** and then **OK**.

It will appear on the left hand side.

3.Quick Search

If you often run the same kind of search with the Windows Search Tool and want to save time, choose **File-Save Search** and save it to the Desktop.

Alternatively, you could right click it and drag it to **Quick Launch**

4.Quick Print

Need a hard copy of a file this instant?. Choose Start - Printers and Faxes then drag your preferred printer onto the Desktop. Now you can drag any printable document from a folder onto the printer icon and it will print immediately.

5.Quick Application switching

Stop wasting your time trying to find your programme on the overcrowded taskbar and just use <Alt> - <Tab> to quickly cycle through all the open applications.

COMPUTER RANDOMLY PLAYS CLASSICAL MUSIC

Do you have mysterious music playing from your computer? If you hear "Fur Elise" or "It's a Small World" emanating from your CPU, Microsoft Knowledge Base Article: 261186 has the answer –

During normal operation or in Safe mode, your computer may play "Fur Elise" or "It's a Small, Small World" seemingly at random. This is an indication sent to the PC speaker from the computer's BIOS that the CPU fan is failing or has failed, or that the power supply voltages have drifted out of tolerance.

This is a design feature of a detection circuit and system BIOSes developed by Award/Unicore from 1997 on.

TECHNICAL CLASSES

For any Club member with an interest in the technical aspects of computers - what the insides look like, what the various bits do - and to acquire a general idea of how computers work - the Monday Technical Class would be a good starting point.

After a few weeks of just listening at the hour long "Question and Answer" session - where members discuss not only problems they have encountered but any aspects of computer technology - new members should readily acquire a basic knowledge of computer hardware and terminology.

After the Q&A session and a welcome cup of coffee any member is encouraged to conduct a short presentation, by projector if appropriate, of technical matters of interest in which they may have some expertise, such as maintenance of anti virus and spyware programs, CD and DVD burning, hard disk partitioning, hard disk imaging, etc.

At present the average attendance at the morning class is ten to fifteen members and this makes it easy for "first timers to lose themselves" before gaining the confidence to join in the discussions.

After the lunch break, the more enthusiastic members stay on to attend to general computer maintenance and to carry out any hardware or software changes which may be necessary for the efficient running of the computers. This hands-on experience also enables members to be invited to join the Technical Crew which, each Tuesday afternoon, maintains the computers located in the Queens Road clubrooms.

Classes commence at 10.00am and are held in what we refer to as "The Annexe", adjacent to the Hurstville Council Offices in McMahon Street - on the second floor through the Wandarrah and Kanyana Rooms entrance.

Classes are informal, the members have a common interest in computers, and therefore relate easily to each other.
