As usual, someone to look forward to.

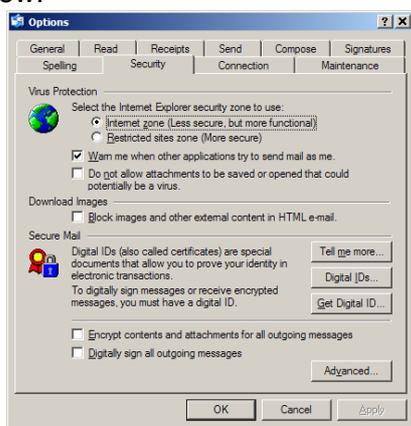

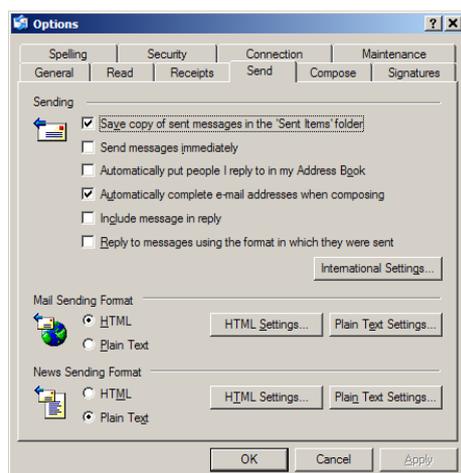

INTERNET

How many times did you hear people saying "You did not send me that document/image you have promised me. I could not find/open the attachment you have sent me" It is not always the sender's fault. Mind you I have been guilty a few times of leaving attachments (Monthly Newsletters mostly) sitting in my PC. (I then blame the gremlins lurking in the ETHERNET) There are two sides of this particular coin. You must have Outlook Express set-up to receive attachments. It is a good idea to have your OE configured the following way: Open OE. Go to Tools>Options, click on the TAB "Security". Make sure to "Untick" the fourth box down, then "Apply and OK" It should look like the screen print below.



When sending E-mails and particularly attachments it is a good idea to attach the document/image as soon as you have created a "New Mail" and saved it to the "Drafts" folder. You should "Save" quite often when creating your masterpiece. Saves a lot of frustration, should you accidentally delete the partly finished work. Always fill out the recipient(s) address(s) last, after you have made all the desired beautifications to your work, such as different fonts, signature, adding background music, etc. To achieve this in OE go to TOOLS>Options>Send. Place a tick only in the first, fourth and second last (HTML) options. Like this:

WHAT IS A "BUFFER"?

A buffer is basically an area of memory that a hardware device or software program uses when it needs a constant, uninterrupted flow of information.

For example, if you ever listened to any kind of streaming audio, the program you use probably "buffers" the signal a little before the music starts to play.

Here's how it works. Your audio program "collects" a few seconds of audio, then starts playing them. If there is a split second interruption, you don't notice it since the audio you're listening to is already a couple seconds old.

Since you're not listening to the audio at the same instant it comes in, it gives the program a few seconds to compensate for any slight interruptions (and there are lots of those). It doesn't always work if the connection isn't good, but it does help.

FULL SCREEN VIEW - INTERNET EXPLORER

Did you know that in Internet Explorer, you can
quickly remove all the toolbars and menus by
pressing the F11 key?

F11 takes you into Full Screen mode, which
gives you more reading space for the website
you're visiting.

Press F11 again to return to normal.

VIRUSES

Most of you will be well protected against
viruses by now - but I wanted to remind you to
UPDATE your anti virus package. I always
recommend using the free AVG Anti-Virus
program - it works really well, but please check
with your own computer guru before you install
it. NB1: When you click the link below to go to
the AVG page, scroll TO THE BOTTOM of the
page to find the program to download.

NB2: Some people have been getting an error
message from AVG: "Internal Virus Database is
out-of-date". If this has happened to you - try the
following to solve the problem:

- Double click on the time in the very bottom
right corner of your screen
- Check that the date and time are correct... if
not - change to the correct settings
- Click Apply, then OK.
