Hopefully our first talk will encourage other members to get involved in the Digital Photography Group, and use that new Digital Camera you received for Christmas to its full potential



The Basics

Insert your numbers into a new Excel spreadsheet. Use this example if you like. Now, click anywhere within that table of figures and press the **F11** key on your keyboard. Magic !

A brand new page appears with a fabulous chart sitting there!



OK, let's go back to the worksheet (click Sheet1 at the bottom left of your screen) and this time

NEXT MEETING 1.30pm Wednesday 31st January

we'll create a chart that sits on top of the current sheet.

Again, **click** anywhere within your table of figures, but this time go up to the toolbar and click the **Chart button** (the one with the bar chart on it).

Now click **Finish**. **Double click** any bit of the chart to get into **Formatting options** and change that bit.

To copy the chart to **Word**, click on it, then hold down the **Shift** key and go to the **Edit** menu in

Excel. Choose **Copy Picture**, then click **As Shown on Screen**.

Then, go to Word and use the keyboard shortcut **Ctrl + V** to paste.

GOOGLE TIP NO 2

A website's address (also known as its Uniform Resource Locator – URL) has the typical format `www.name.category.country`.

The category and country components are called domains. Codes for category domains include *com*, *org*, *gov*, *edu*, etc. Codes for country domains include *au*, *uk*, *jp*, *fr*, *de*, etc. Not all sites, including American sites, include a country domain code.

Tip 2: Use the **site:** operator in Google to restrict a search to a particular site or domain.

Examples:

1. To restrict a search for information on a Microsoft product to the Microsoft site, a typical search entry could be **sound in powerpoint site:microsoft.com**.
2. To find what information is available at Australian government sites on age pensions, a search entry could be **age pension site:gov.au**.
3. To discover what information is available at academic sites on a subject like genealogy, a search entry could be **genealogy site:edu**.

ADD - REMOVE FILES YOU CAN'T FIND

Q. I want to go through and remove some of the programs I know I have on my computer, but when I go to my Add/Remove Programs list, I can't find them. How can I get rid of them?

A. This isn't uncommon. Some programs just like to be a little stubborn. Most Windows components can be uninstalled by going to the Add/Remove Windows Components section in the Control Panel. But, what about the ones you can't find? You know they're on your computer somewhere, but how can you get rid of them if you can't find them? Well, it's actually not too hard to bring these out of their hiding. Let's learn how!

Bring up the Windows Explorer (one way to do this is to right click on the Start button and select Explore).

Find your way to C:\Windows\Inf. (Double click on the My Computer icon on your desktop, double click on the C: drive and then go from there).

Make a copy of the "Sysoc.inf" file. (Click the file and hit Ctrl + C then Ctrl + V).


Next, right click "Sysoc.inf" and choose Open with, then Notepad.



Type Ctrl + H to bring up the Replace box.

Replace `,hide,` (comma hide comma) with `,,` (comma comma).

Then hit the Replace All button.



Save the file.

Now, when you go to Start, Control Panel, Add/Remove Programs, Add/Remove Windows Components, you will see stuff that wasn't there before. Some of the items will be in subfolders, like "Games," which is under "Accessories." Double click to open any folder. Just uncheck the items you want to remove. There you have it. No more hidden programs!

SUBJECT: PC UPDATES

Last year I upgraded from Boyfriend 5.0 to Husband 1.0 and noticed a distinct slow down in the overall performance, particularly in the flowers and jewellery applications, which operated flawlessly under Boyfriend 5.0.

In addition, Husband 1.0 un-installed many other valuable programs, such as Romance 9.5 and Personal Attention 6.5 and then installed undesirable programs such as: Football 5.0, Rugby 4.3 and Cricket 3.0. Conversation 8.0 no longer runs; it simply crashes the system. I've tried running Nagging 5.3 to fix these problems, to no avail. What can I do?

First keep in mind, Boyfriend 5.0 is an Entertainment Package, while Husband 1.0 is an Operating System. Try entering the command: C:/I-THOUGHT-YOU-LOVED-ME to download Tears 6.2, which should automatically install Guilt 3.0. If that application works as designed, Husband 1.0 should then automatically run the applications Jewellery 2.0 and Flowers 3.5. But remember, overuse of the above application can cause Husband 1.0 to default to Grumpy Silence 2.5, Happy Hour 7.0, or Beer 6.1.

WARNING: Beer 6.1 is a very nasty program that will create Snoring Loudly.

CAUTION: Whatever you do, DO NOT install Mother-in-law. This is an unsupported application and will crash Husband 1.0.

IT'S OK TO APPLY

♦ DO YOU know the difference between Apply and OK?

If you were to make an adjustment to a setting on your computer and you then click OK the adjustment would only last while the computer was on.

When you reboot it would be back to the original setting. If you were to click Apply then OK the adjustment would be permanent.

♦ WHAT is an e-mail attachment? It's a file you include with an e-mail. For example, let's say you have a text document or **picture** you want to share with someone.

You can "attach" this document to an email and send it off to them.

Click on the Paperclip on the Tool bar. You then get a dialogue box that lets you navigate to, and attach, the file of your choice. You will still have the original as only a copy is sent. Keep an eye on the size of the file you're sending. Your recipient may not appreciate downloading a 3 meg file.

♦ WHEN entering the serial number for a program you're installing, use the number keys that are above the letter keys on your keyboard.

Sometimes the numbers on the keypad at the right side of your keyboard are interpreted as different characters. This will prevent the serial number from being accepted even though it looks right.
