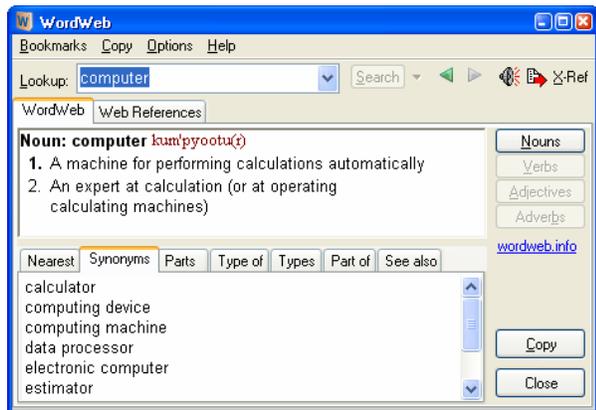

WORDWEB 5

Do you ever need to consult a dictionary or thesaurus to check the spelling, meaning, pronunciation or synonym of a word?

The free edition of WordWeb 5, available as a 7.5 megabyte file from www.wordweb.info, is a very useful and convenient desktop dictionary program containing 150,000 root words and 120,000 synonym sets.

WordWeb integrates with most programs, allowing you to directly check the meaning of words within a document.

For \$39 you can purchase WordWeb Pro 5, which has many extra features, including 6,000 more definitions, a crossword solver and anagram finder.

Both the WordWeb 5 free and Pro editions are designed to work with operating systems from Windows 98 to Vista.

KEEP CHECK ON ADDRESSES

EVERY time you reply to an email you can automatically record that address in your address book.

This is great if you only send emails to a few people. But if you send a lot, you could end up with a giant list of addresses and no clue who they all are. So, how do you stop this?

In Outlook Express, go to tools/options and click the "send" tab. Uncheck the box marked "automatically put people I reply to in my address book".

You can now have an address book filled only with people you actually plan to e-mail, rather than a mystery list of addresses.

If you do get an e-mail from a new contact you can right click their email and choose "add sender to address book".

Have you wondered how to add an attachment to an email in Outlook Express or Microsoft Outlook?

Compose a new email by clicking on the new or create icon.

Write your email then click on the icon that looks like a small paperclip.

The dialogue box that appears allows you to choose a folder in the 'look in' window. Browse that folder and double click on the file you want to attach.

If successfully attached you should see an icon of the attachment in your email.

You can download additional clip art from Microsoft, but you can also download templates for all sorts of things, such as flyers and family newsletters.

There are already templates available - have a look at MS Word. Click on file menu and choose new.

From the resulting window on the right hand side choose 'on my computer'. A window appears with several choices.

Double click on the template you want and it will open up ready to use.

TAP IN TO KEYBOARD SKILLS

Most of us don't use the Num Lock key. The Num Lock key is at the top of the numeric keypad on your keyboard.

If you hold that key down for five seconds you can turn on Accessibility Options that will cause your computer to beep whenever you accidentally hit the Caps Lock key, Scroll Lock key, or the Num Lock key.

When you hold it down for five seconds, a light will come on indicating the Num Lock key is depressed. A dialogue window will appear and tell you that you've turned on your Accessibility

Options and give you the option to click OK if you want to keep the Option on.

This works with Windows XP Home or Professional.

If you turn your keyboard over you should see two clips on either side of the keyboard.

If you pull those clips out and then set your keyboard back down, you will notice that it gains a little bit of height, usually towards the back. Try it - you'll find it more comfortable to use.

We are all becoming more e-security aware and look for the closed padlock on sites that are supposed to be safe.

The closed lock icon signifies the website uses encryption to help protect any sensitive, personal information you enter, such as your credit card number or payment details.

Did you know you can check the security certificate before you enter personal or financial information by double clicking the lock icon to display the security certificate for the site?

The name following Issued To should match the name of the site.

If the name differs, you may be on a fake site, also called a "**spoofed**" site. If you're not sure whether a certificate is legitimate, don't enter any personal information. Play it safe and leave.

THUMB DRIVES

You may recall that in an earlier issue of the newsletter we included a lengthy contribution about the merits of thumb (flash) drives. Here's some additional and interesting information

USB flash drives are incredible devices, you must agree.

On that one little stick, you can hold as much information as a full-fledged hard drive could hold less than five years ago! Now, everything is portable and it's so convenient. But, are you using it to its full capacity? Or as easily as it could be?

By using a small (and free!) utility from Microsoft, you can vastly expand the flexibility of your little USB drive. This program is called **Flash Drive Manager**. And it can be found on the Microsoft website

You may have wondered how long a flash drive really can last. Allow me to give you the basics.

Flash drives can only handle so many write, erase and rewrite cycles. (That is, when you

save something to your flash drive, you erase it and then save something else). They are strongly built, but just like any other product, they can start to wear out with time. So, how many cycles can your flash drive take? Typically, a flash drive can support several hundred thousand rewrites. The process will start to slow down once your device starts to age, but all in all, it will probably last for quite some time.

However, all of that does depend on a few factors. For example, how often you do rewrites, the size of the data you save, how much you use your flash drive for anything else, the speed of your computer, etc. While some things will determine how many cycles you will get out of a flash drive, you have to keep in mind that either way, you will be getting your money's worth. Even 100,000 rewrites would be doing that, let alone several of them. Take it as you will!

LET XP RESIZE PICTURES FOR YOUR EMAIL

I have been asked this one so frequently in class so here it is!!

I use the "Send To" options frequently (see below).

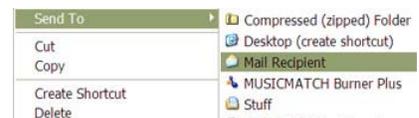
One of the Send To options listed is "Mail Recipient" which allows you to send a document or picture to someone via email (using Outlook Express).

If you choose this option for a picture you will be given the option to "Make all my pictures smaller". This is a great feature, saving you the time of resizing it in your imaging software.

Now, let's look at this a bit slower...

Find a picture that you want to email and right click.

Choose "Send to" and select "Mail Recipient"



A window will pop up with the option "Make my pictures smaller"

Click OK. You should see an email with the picture as an attachment.

Now, with smaller files, under 50k, you won't see much change, but with large files you will. I had a 370k picture and it was reduced to less than 50k!

This certainly makes pictures easier to email
