IMGBurn

When students burn a CD or DVD they usually use NERO which is often supplied with your DVD hardware and which can be somewhat bloated and not all that easy to use for those new to CD and DVD copying

IMGBurn is a piece of software which is highly recommended as a replacement for Nero, and is possibly better than Nero for new computer users. Over the years I have used many burning products but I have found IMGBurn to be the most powerful of the free versions.

ImgBurn includes support for:

- every modern optical disc from CD to Blu-Ray
- more than 10 image formats
- authoring rewritable discs
- producing images from file compilations or discs
- building audio CDs from a variety of file types
- creating video discs on DVD, Blu-Ray, and HD-DVD

TOP 10 TIPS FOR TAKING GREAT PHOTOGRAPHS

Do you wish you were a better photographer? All it takes is a little know-how and experience. Keep reading for some important picture-taking tips then grab your camera and start shooting your way to great pictures.

1. Direct eye contact can be as engaging in a picture as it is in real life. When taking a picture of someone, hold the camera at the person's eye level to unleash the power of those magnetic gazes and mesmerising smiles. For children, that means stooping to their level.

2. A plain background shows off the subject you are photographing.

3. Bright sun can create unattractive deep facial shadows. Eliminate the shadows by using your flash to lighten the face.

4. If your subject is smaller than a car, take a step or two closer before taking the picture and zoom in on your subject. Your goal is to fill the picture area with the subject you are photographing. Up close you can reveal telling details, like a sprinkle of freckles or an arched eyebrow. But don't get too close or your pictures will be blurry.

5. Centre-stage is a great place for a performer to be. However, the middle of your picture is not the best place for your subject. Bring your picture to life by simply moving your subject away from the middle of your picture.

6. If your subject is not in the centre of the picture, you need to lock the focus to create a sharp picture. Most auto-focus cameras focus on whatever is in the centre of the picture.

7. The number one flash mistake is taking pictures beyond the flash's range. Pictures taken beyond the maximum flash range will be too dark. For many cameras, the maximum flash range is less than 15 feet - about five steps away.

8. Light is very important - it affects the appearance of everything you photograph. Bright sunlight from the side can enhance wrinkles. But the soft light of a cloudy day can subdue those same wrinkles. For landscapes, try to take pictures early or late in the day when the light is orangish and rakes across the land.

9. Turn your camera sideways. All sorts of things look better in a vertical picture. From a lighthouse near a cliff to the Eiffel Tower to your four-year-old grand-daughter jumping in a puddle.

10. Take control of your picture taking and watch your photos dramatically improve. Don't be a passive picture taker - take charge. Pick the location, add props and move in close.

MICROSOFT SECURITY ESSENTIALS

AVG has, for many years, been very popular amongst our members mainly because of recommendation by Tutors.



Microsoft has recently released its own FREE Security Suite, called Security Essentials which can be downloaded from:

www.microsoft.com/security_essentials

The install is quick and easy, with three versions available for download. One is for 32-bit XP systems, the others are separate 32- and 64-bit releases for Vista and Windows 7. At just over 4MB, it takes less than a minute to download over a broadband connection.

Once installed it will automatically update to new versions as they come out, and then regularly download updated signature files as they become available from Microsoft Update.

When you're up and running, Security Essentials will download the most recent set of signatures and scan your PC for the first time. It's a good idea to change the scan schedule as soon as possible - I recommend a daily quick scan at a time your PC is likely to be on.

Security Essentials works so unobtrusively that it's a good idea to keep an eye on its history, just to see what's been blocked, what's been quarantined, and what you've let into your PC.

MSE also offers real time scanning of files as you open them, and when you download them from the web.

We'd recommend changing the default scan time to something that's more suitable as soon as possible. It's also a good idea to see if MSE's default actions are what you want.

While MSE will update its malware definitions automatically, there's always the option to download the latest files, especially if you're aiming to scan a machine that you don't regularly use.

The warning dialog box is clear and descriptive, with links to additional online information. There's enough information to help even the most naive user decide what to do.

If a new piece of malware appears on the net, and if it's detected by MSE, then it'll report back to Microsoft, and the information used to help build a signature file that can be delivered to every MSE.

If you inadvertently attempt to download malware, MSE will warn you that you're doing something potentially unsafe, and blocks you from completing the action.
