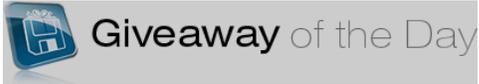
The Internet in Family History - Friend or Foe?

87% of Australians are concerned about identity theft.

According to The Australian Federal Police (AFP), identity fraud costs the nation up to \$4 billion a year.



When it comes to concerns about identity fraud, women, far more than men, fear financial loss, poor credit rating, feeling personally violated and embarrassment.

81% of middle Australians (household income \$40k - \$69k) are most likely to put themselves at risk of identity theft by throwing out personal information such as utility bills and credit card statements

### SUSPICIOUS PHONE CALLS

A member has related her recent experience of receiving the following "banking survey" phone call:

"A couple of weeks ago I had a call from an Asian lady who said she was doing a survey for 'Banking Australia'. She started off with a couple of simple questions and I told her I had a visitor and had to go and hung up."

"She rang straight back and said there was just one more question to the survey and asked which bank I was with and I foolishly told her St.George and that I was very happy with them."

"Fast forward on a couple of weeks and on Thursday afternoon I had a call from an Asian man who said he was calling from St.George Bank and he was informing me that, as a valued customer, he wanted me to know that I had been over-charged on some of my transactions and would be reimbursed, and I would be getting a call the next day from Fair Trading (I think he said it was) who would tell me the amount I was to be reimbursed."

"I said I would not be home and he asked for my mobile number and I said I didn't have a mobile. I then asked him his name which he said was Patrick and I then said please give me your phone number and he hung up. Obviously another con or scam whichever name applies but I think it's worth passing on."

"Of course I still get regular calls telling me my computer needs fixing."

This story is a timely reminder for all of us to be careful with information we disclose during those annoying unsolicited phone calls.

## PHOTO SHARING

### Why Use a Photo Sharing Service?

We assume that you have taken hundreds of photos using your new digital camera which you were gifted over the Christmas holidays.

What to do with all those digital photos ? and all those taken over the years, digital and otherwise ?

It is hard to imagine anything more joyful than sitting with the ones you love and sharing pictures of the good times you have spent together. In an era where all of your loved ones might not live under the same roof, or even in the same city or state, this cherished pastime is quickly becoming a thing of the past.

That was until **photo sharing services** started bringing families together over the internet.

As with all internet and file sharing there is a degree of LEARNING and reading up before you begin to upload your pictures. Fortunately there are plenty of websites and guides to help you. You may upload your photos to any one of the following services.

Uploading your photos to these sites is easy and quick, and may be done in batches.

Uploading photos directly from camera phones is a handy feature. Some photo sharing services have apps that will upload a photo from your phone with one click, while others force you to send an email with a file attachment.

All photo sharing sites have a host of features that make photo sharing easy, fun, and sociable. Here are some of the options to look for in an online photo storage service.

Photo sharing services should make the process of uploading and sharing your pictures as painless as possible. You don't have to jump through hoops to have your photos uploaded. They also want services that are going to leave their options open.

### Basic Features

The ideal photo sharing service needs to give its users a number of different features. When it comes to dealing with anything multimedia related, the users in question will want to be able to do a lot of things with their photos. If they don't have the

options they need, they will search elsewhere for a service that will give them the right tools.

### Photo Features

The photo sharing service you choose should offer a simple upload process and should include the option to upload one photo or several photos at the same time. You should spend time enhancing and sharing your photos instead of having to upload photos one by one.

A good photo sharing service will also allow you to upload your photos directly from a camera phone.

### Community

A photo sharing site should allow you to join user forums to share your photos and experiences. Some sites we reviewed will allow you to share your photos in groups that are user defined as well as predefined by the company. Some groups are listed in vague terms such as "sports," while others are more defined such as "ATV Riding". Consider which type of community you are looking for before choosing a photo sharing site.

### Help/Support

Whenever you are using any online service, it is good to know that there are knowledgeable customer service representatives available to help you out if you have any questions. The best photo sharing services offer a solid support system that is capable of answering any questions you might have. The best photo sharing services will offer a list of FAQs on their website as well as user forums.

**Photo sharing services** give you the tools to help you put your pictures on the web, the world's stage. There you can share your photos almost instantaneously with as many people as you want. You also have the option to choose who can see your photos to ensure your privacy.

There are no limits to how you share your photos anymore. With a world of possibilities at your fingertips, what you are going to do with it is up to you.

Integration with social networks is an important part of photo sharing services. Look for buttons that enable you to share photos on Twitter, Facebook, and your other favorite social sites.

Too much sharing can be a dangerous thing. You should be able to set up public and private albums, and even password-protected access to albums or specific photos. An "invite" feature lets you send emails or text messages to selected contacts inviting them to view your latest photos.
