ASCCA COMPETITIONS

The ASCCA Digital Photography, Short Writing and PhotoStory competitions are here again We should start early and this year make a CONCERTED effort to place our Club on the computer map.

I am sure we will have scores of impressive entries from members of our Digital Photography Group.

But this year, being our fifteenth anniversary year, we should ALL enter the Creative Writing competition which includes prose and poetry. The details are:

Prose – You can enter one story only for each of the three topics, which are

1. The Hat

Do you remember some of the hats you or other people wore? Do you remember when all men wore felt hats and took them off inside and raised them in acknowledgement of a lady they knew? Did you have a favourite hat?

This is a topic to take you to any time or place of your choosing in just 1,000 words or less - as long as there is a hat involved somewhere.

2. Too Good to Use

Great scope for imagination or reminiscences here! For this topic you can write 1,000 words or less.

3. Out of the Blue!

This is a real short story challenge. Can you write a really short but complete story in just **500** words? Of course you can!

Poetry – You can enter one poem only for each of the three topics

1. Writing a poem without rhyme – by using metaphors and similes, as well as rhythms, you can explore the “music” of what some consider true poetry and what could perhaps become the words to a song. Just 300 words or less for this poem on any topic of your choice.

2. Writing a poem about “an event or incident” using no more than 300 words

3. Writing a poem about “a particular location” using no more than 300 words

Please carefully read and comply with all the conditions of entry listed on the ASCCA website below. Note there are some changes in these requirements from last year.

An Internet basics website is now available and I am impressed by its content. The site uses easy-to-follow instructions and videos, and includes a video on how to stay safe on the Internet.

It has been designed for seniors and for those who are new to online, and is also ideal if you aren't yet as confident using the internet as you would like to be.

BANKS and police have produced some handy information to help people safely bank and transact with their smartphones and tablets.

The Australian Bankers' Association and the Australian Federal Police have prepared a fact sheet - Banking on the go: security tips for your smartphone and tablet - which provides advice and some simple steps you can take to protect personal and financial information.

Smartphone and tablet technology is revolutionising the way we, live, pay and bank.

Both are mobile computers and you can pay on the go, check your balances, track your savings and even split that bill at the restaurant.

Unfortunately, fraud, scams and harassment have now moved into the digital world as criminals use the technology to commit old crimes in new ways.

Smartphones and tablets allow you to access the Internet and email, download applications and games, and store personal contacts, photos and information.

You need to protect and secure your smartphone and tablet just as you would your home computer or laptop.

Consumers are protected by ASIC's Electronic Funds Transfer Code of Conduct which sets out rules about how electronic funds transfers should work.

All retail banks offering electronic banking services are signatories to the code. This means bank customers are protected - they are not considered liable if unauthorised transactions are made with their cards, smartphones or tablets and will be reimbursed as long as they have taken due care.

Of course, you need to keep your access codes and passwords private.
