CLUB NEWS


Welcome back after our brief break.. We have work to do! Students, tutors and the committee are entering the last quarter of this year together with some challenging tasks ahead.

COPYRIGHT PROBLEM

Recently we have been informed by TPG (our Internet provider), that a student had inadvertently partly downloaded copyright movies while in a class. This is NOT permitted. Students are advised to disable Torrent Clients before they enter the classroom - or alternatively NOT bring their laptops into the computer room.

WINDOWS 8.1

Windows 8.1, the comprehensive update to Windows 8, has been released.

It's available now to existing Windows 8 users, although it is not an automatic update. To get hold of the new version, you'll need to launch the store app in the Modern UI, where the Windows 8.1 upgrade should appear as a pending upgrade. The download is around 3GB and may take up to around 3 hours. Once the download starts the rest should be automatic.

But be aware of your download limit using the internet. Depending on your internet provider, if you exceed your monthly download limit your speed may be greatly decreased for the remainder of the month, or you may incur an excess charge.

It is also available for purchase in retail stores for about \$149.

TABLET BUYERS' GUIDE

So you're looking at Tablets. They come in all sizes and formats and maybe you would like to purchase one soon. We are fortunate that **Geoff Turton** has done much to popularise the use of Tablets in our Club by running a number of courses over the past year. By all reports these courses have been well received.

Tablet computers are the biggest growth area for computers. The growing popularity of these highly portable, touch-driven devices is fuelled by their light weight, relatively low cost and non-technical ease of use.

There is now a wide selection of tablets with varying screen sizes, processors, operating systems and prices - but which one do you choose?



The "new wave" of consumer tablets arrived just three short years ago with the launch of the iPad in 2010. However, the rapid adoption of

tablets by every category of user from children to grandparents makes it seem like they've been around a lot longer.

Tablets put everything you need right at your fingertips, from the Web and Facebook to games, movies, email and lots more with more than 870,000 apps available for all sorts of uses. The trick is getting the right tablet for you If you don't already have a tablet, chances are you soon will. In fact, this year analysts predict that sales of tablets will surpass desktop PCs, and they'll overtake laptops by 2014. Even if you do own a tablet, it's nearly time for an upgrade. But do you go with the iPad, Android or Windows 8? How do you decide which Tablet to acquire?

Prices vary widely, from \$150 to \$2000, covering a very basic unit to one with every bell and whistle imaginable.

Four Questions to Ask Before You Buy

1. Which Platform Is Best for You? (Apple, Android or Windows?)

Here's what you need to know about each of the big three operating systems.

iOS + iPad or iPad mini

You can now choose between the 9.7 inch iPad 4th generation with fabulous Retina display or the

7.9 inch iPad mini, which is a more convenient size. It is the dead-simple interface and vast number of apps that attracts most fans to Apple's platform.

With something like 375,000 apps designed specifically for the iPad (900,000 total), Apple's tablet app selection is clearly superior to anything else on the market.

Android

The world of Android tablets can definitely be confusing. On one side you have Tablets that offer a pure version of Google's OS, such as the Google Nexus 7 and 10.

Windows

The fact that there are two versions of Windows for tablets (8 and RT) will confuse some members. Both offer Microsoft's new Live Tilebased user interface, feature the new Windows Store, but lack the familiar Start button.

2. What size screen do you need?

If you're looking for a lightweight device that fits in a purse or bag and allows you to read and watch video on the go, you'll want to consider a 7 inch tablet such as the Google Nexus 7 or a slightly larger device like the 20cm iPad mini. 7 inch tablets are easy to hold with just one hand, but they don't provide the most immersive experience.

8.9, 10 or 11.6 inch tablets provides a bigger canvas for surfing the Web and watching video and more real estate for editing documents.

3. Where will you get content?

Tablets are great for media usage - whether you're watching videos, reading ebooks or playing games or seeking information, using Skype and Facebook - which is why the media stores appropriate for a specific tablet should influence your purchasing decision.

Examine where your existing content lives before making a new purchase. Apple's robust app and content selection is still tops, but Amazon is a close second, especially if you're an Amazon Prime member.

4. How much do you want to spend?

Prices of tablets vary widely depending on brands and specification. Checking prices on-line is recommended, and watch out for specials that pop up from time to time.

Bottom Line

Apple's iPad line is still the king of tablets because of its ease of use, design and vast app selection. However, Android tablets tend to be more affordable, and on the higher end you'll find unique features such as pen input in the Galaxy.

So by now you've likely made up your mind on a platform and size, and it's just a matter of deciding on an exact model. If you frequently need to use a tablet outside of an area with Wi-Fi, you can purchase a tablet with built-in 4G.

SOFTWARE YOU DON'T NEED

While surfing the Net you may see advertisements for all sorts of system tools and optimization utilities. What is worse, a message can pop up on your screen telling you to download a program to clean your computer. It's easy for companies to tell you that you absolutely have to run these tools, but you don't need most of the junk on offer.

Using these system tools most often slows downs your computer, wastes your time, and makes your life more complicated. Simplify your life and skip these system tools - you only need the essentials

If you must use a registry cleaner, use the registry cleaner built into **CCleaner** and skip all the paid registry cleaners produced by shady companies. See www.piriform.com/ccleaner

Computer cleaning utilities are another worthless category of software. Like registry cleaners, they're advertised on banner ads all over the web.

In previous editions of this newsletter we have covered why PC-cleaning software programs are generally scams. Sure, you can free up space and maybe even speed up your PC by deleting temporary files - but you can do that with the free CCleaner application or even the Disk Cleanup tool included with Windows. Skip the paid applications, which quite often don't work as well as the free alternatives.
