The Annexe is upstairs on the top level of the Hurstville Entertainment Centre building. Enter via the Function Rooms door to the left of the Civic Theatre entrance in McMahon Street. The computer room is on the left at the top of the second flight of stairs.

SHOW / HIDE OFFICE RIBBONS

The ribbons that display options and features for Microsoft Office applications occupy screen space that might otherwise be used to display more of your work sheet. There are a couple of methods to minimise the ribbons when they are not being used.



1. Double-click on any ribbon tab to minimise the ribbons. Left-clicking on a tab label will temporarily display that ribbon until you click anywhere off the ribbon.

Double-click on any ribbon tab to restore the ribbon display.

2. Right-click on any ribbon tab, then select the "Minimize the Ribbon" option.



PASTING WITHOUT FORMATTING

If you want to paste text into a MS Word document from another document or web page, you must first select the text in the source document, then copy it to your computer's clipboard by using the **Home > Copy** option or the **Ctrl+C** keyboard shortcut.

After placing the cursor in the destination document, if you use the **Home > Paste** option or the **Ctrl+V** keyboard shortcut, the pasted text will include the formatting from the source document.

There are several ways to paste text so that it inherits the destination Word document's formatting -

- 1. Use **Home > Paste Special...** and select the **Unformatted Text** option.
- 2. PureText 3.0, a small free program available at http://stevemiller.net/puretext, adds a customisable hot-key feature to Windows which allows text to be pasted without the source document formatting. The default hot-key shortcut is Windows Key+V.
- 3. A two-stage process which firstly involves pasting the text into Windows Notepad text editor to remove the source formatting. The text in Notepad is then copied and pasted into the destination document, where it inherits that document's formatting.



GEEK UNINSTALLER


If you install and uninstall a lot of applications, your registry and file systems may be filled with little bits and pieces left behind from previously uninstalled programs.

Geek Uninstaller is a lightweight uninstaller that does not require installation, which means that it is a perfect portable maintenance tool – just send the download to your flash drive and it will be ready for use. The program is available at http://www.geekuninstaller.com/

USB CONNECTORS

Have you ever wondered why USB plugs and sockets have different coloured plastic connectors? The three colours are white (version 1), black (version 2) and blue (version 3). They are all interchangeable. However, connecting a blue plug to a blue socket will give you the fastest transfer rate between an external storage drive or other plug in USB devices.

COMPUTING IN MAY



On 11 May 1979, Harvard MBA candidate Daniel Bricklin and programmer Robert Frankston gave the first public demonstration of VisiCalc, the program that made a business machine of the Apple II personal computer. VisiCalc (visible calculator) automated the

recalculation of spreadsheets. A huge success, and a precursor to Excel, more than 100,000 copies of VisiCalc were sold in the first year.

"VISICALC represented a new idea of a way to use a computer and a new way of thinking about the world. Where conventional programming was thought of as a sequence of steps, this new thing was no longer sequential in effect: When you made a change in one place, all other things changed instantly and automatically."
