Geoff Turton replaced the scheduled guest speaker at our May meeting and gave an informative talk on the subject "*22 Things To Do With Google*".



While all web browsers can process queries entered into Google's search engine via a keyboard, for computers with a microphone, Google Chrome browser can process voice enquiries.

The following search terms demonstrate Google search engine's versatility:

- "**distance** [place A] [place B]" displays the distance and travel time from place A to place B.
- "**share price** [company]" shows the share prices for the selected company over various time periods.
- "**forecast** [location]" presents the weather forecast for the required location.
- "[**flight number**]" shows the current status for the required flight anywhere in the world.
- "**translate** [word or phrase]" shows how text in one language looks and sounds in another chosen language.

ATO AND ACC SCAM ALERTS

Western Australia's ScamNet service is warning that people are receiving threatening telephone calls from scammers claiming to be from government or law enforcement agencies.

The scammers reportedly claim to represent the Australian Crime Commission (ACC) or the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) and tell call recipients that they face legal proceedings.

The scammers tell the recipients to call back on a number with the prefix '02' in an attempt to add credibility to the call. However, the call is likely to be redirected to the scammers' true location overseas.

At some point during their conversations scammers will demand payment by wire transfer, electronic voucher or bank transfer.

The ACC and ATO have advised that they will not contact individuals by phone about legal proceedings.

• Staying safe

If you receive one of these calls, hang up immediately and do not respond to requests to call back.

Do not provide any details confirming your identity or location, and do not share any financial information with the caller.

If the caller persists, contact the Australian Federal Police or state police forces for assistance.

MULTIPLE TIME ZONES DISPLAY

With both Windows 7 and Windows 8.1, when you click on the Date/Time display in the desktop system tray, a calendar and a clock showing the local time is displayed by default.

However, it is possible to add one or two more clocks showing times in other time zones. This can be useful when contacting people overseas.

With the calendar and main clock displayed, click on the *Change date and time settings ...* link.

Adjust the local date and time under the *Date and Time* tab.

Under the *Additional Clocks* tab, to setup one or two additional clocks:

- Tick the *Show this clock* box,
- Select the required time zone, and
- *Enter display name*: for each clock, then
- Click *Apply*, then *OK*.

Tech TIPS

• The **Windows key**  is found on keyboards using the Microsoft Windows operating system. Using the Windows key in combination with another key allows you to perform common tasks more quickly. For example :

- **WinKey + E** opens File Explorer,
 - **WinKey Plus (+) or Minus (-)** opens Windows Magnifier. Zoom in with the plus symbol (+) and zoom out with the minus symbol (-).
 - Press **WinKey + Esc** to close the Magnifier.
 - If you have several windows open on the desktop pressing **WinKey + D** will minimize all windows to the taskbar.
- To quickly rename a file, select the file and press the **F2** key. Type in a new name for the file.

COMPUTING IN JUNE



Born on **8 June 1955**, computer scientist **Tim Berners-Lee** went on to create the foundations for the World Wide Web in 1989 while undertaking research work at CERN, the European Organisation for Nuclear Research, in Switzerland.

Berners-Lee wanted a standard method to make the results of experiments conducted at CERN by researchers from all over the world to be readily accessible to researchers everywhere.

His specifications for URLs (web addresses), HTML (hypertext markup language) for creating web documents and HTTP (hypertext transmission protocol) for transmitting these documents between computers initiated the World Wide Web we access to-day.

In addition to receiving many academic and international awards, Berners-Lee became a Fellow of the Royal Society in 2001 and was knighted in 2004.

FREE UPGRADE TO WINDOWS 10

A "Get Windows 10" icon may have recently appeared in the notification area at the right-hand end of your computer's task bar. The appearance of this icon indicates that your current version of Windows 7 or 8.1 is eligible for a free upgrade to Windows 10.



When you click on the icon, details of the upgrade process are displayed. If you choose to "Reserve your free upgrade", 3GB of upgrade files will be downloaded progressively to your computer prior to the official Windows 10 launch on **29 July 2015**. You can then decide when to install the upgrade.

If you reserve your free upgrade, then subsequently change your mind, you can cancel a "Get Windows 10" reservation as follows:

1. Right-click on the "Get Windows 10" icon.
2. Click on "Check your upgrade status".
3. Click on the menu icon  above the "All done for now" message.
4. Click on the "View Confirmation" option.
5. Click on "Cancel reservation".
6. Click on "Cancel Reservation" confirmation.
7. Click on the "Close" button.

You will be able to download and install the free Windows 10 upgrade at any time during the twelve months after the official launch date. So, it may be worth waiting a while to see if other users have any problems with the upgrade.

The best way to remove the "Get Windows 10" icon from the notification area is to uninstall Windows update **KB3035583**, the update that put it there in the first place. To do this:

1. Go to *Control Panel > Programs and Features*.
2. Click on "View installed updates".
3. Find and select "Update for Microsoft Windows (KB3035583)" that was first installed around 15 May 2015.
4. Click on "Uninstall".
