OCTOBER MEETING

Mark Herron, whose experience with computers includes developing and delivering in-house training material for software systems in a large federal government department, will present an overview of **Facebook** and demonstrate how Facebook can be used as an effective tool for recording and sharing family history research.



SEPTEMBER MEETING

In his talk on "My Life Before Personal Computers", **Geoff Turton** outlined how he was born in Griffith and went to school there, before commencing Electrical Engineering studies at Sydney University in 1964. Following two years National Service, Geoff returned to work with the PMG's Department in telephone exchange network design and construction sections in NSW country and metropolitan areas.



Geoff's interests in computers flowed from his long-held fascination with calculating devices, including adding machines, slide rules, abacusses and electronic calculators.

Mark Young, ASCCA's technical officer, trainer and webmaster gave us an informative overview of Windows 10 but suggested you might want to defer upgrading to Windows 10 immediately if you are happy with Windows 7 or you are planning to buy a new computer in the near future.



Reasons to upgrade to Windows 10 include:

- It is an improvement on Windows 8 and 8.1. The traditional Start menu is back and the Charms bar is gone.
- Microsoft support will extend from January 2020 for Windows 7 to October 2025 for Windows 10.
- If you like working with new things.
- Upgrades to Windows 10 are free for Windows 7 SP1 and Windows 8.1 users until 29 July 2016.

New features include:

- Edge web browser, although Internet Explorer is still available under Windows Accessories.
- Photos app which now includes some editing features.
- Multiple desktops.

Tech TIPS

• CTRL+S

When you spend time and effort creating a document or editing an image on your computer, it is extremely frustrating to lose



your work because of a system failure or a program accidentally closing. The solution is to

KEEP CALM and CTRL + S

SAVE... SAVE... SAVE... and this can be done quickly with the keyboard shortcut **CTRL+S**, which eliminates the need to reach for the mouse to select a Save option.

• SEARCHING FOR FILE CONTENT


If you are looking for files containing a specific string of text (eg: a person's name), this can be done in Windows / File Explorer by selecting the folder containing the files to be searched, then using the following format to enter your search term in the search box at the top right-hand corner of the Windows or File Explorer window:

content:"my string to search for".

PROGRAMS TOOLBAR


If you have many programs installed on your computer, you may find that accessing them may be a bit cumbersome, particularly with Windows 8.1 and 10. Access to your programs can be augmented by adding a Programs toolbar to the taskbar on your desktop.

To do this, right-click on the taskbar and select **Toolbars > New toolbar...**




Type, or copy and paste, the following path in the Folder field:

C:\ProgramData\Microsoft\Windows\Start Menu\Programs



Click the **Select Folder** button.

The resulting Programs menu item will appear on the taskbar, immediately to the left of the notification area. Click the chevron next to the name and a pop-up menu will appear.



This feature is available in the three operating systems Windows 7, 8.1 and 10.

INTERACTIVE MAP TOOL

Cartographers have always had a problem representing the surface of Earth on a flat 2-dimensional map. With the commonly used Mercator projection, the relative sizes of countries further from the equator appear greater than those closer to the equator.

At <http://thetruesize.com/>, an interactive map of the world allows you to compare the relative sizes of two countries by selecting one and overlaying it the other. As a country is moved, its relative size reduces as it is moved towards the equator and increases as it is moved away from the equator.

As an example, the land areas of China, India and the United States can easily fit into the land area of Africa. You can also see the relative sizes of Australia and Greenland.



Here's how it works:

- To select a country, type its name into the search box and click on its name in the search results.
- Double-click on a selected country to change its colour.
- Selected countries can be moved by dragging them.
- To rotate a country, drag the compass around.
- Use the mouse wheel to zoom in and out.
- Right-click on a country to deselect it.

This interactive map shows our world in a new light.
